From the Pastor Terry Dougherty

I have always been a "bookish" person. If family lore is to be believed, the only reason I learned to count before I learned to read was that I learned to count turning the pages of *Winnie the Pooh* (still a favorite!). As I grew up,

books were a refuge, and a portal. I went through periods of fascination with astronomy, ecology, ancient history, ... etc. When I became a little more selective, it was because of beauty. As a kid who hitch-hiked down to Long Branch, NJ often, I split my time between The Inkwell (open late, until later) and the Guggenheim Memorial Library of Monmouth College (open whenever, until the Inkwell did). At that time, the Guggenheim had the most wonderful collection of antique, art and rare books I had ever seen. There I met Dr. Keith, who taught English Lit at Monmouth and who just happened to operate the Keith Library at the Red Bank Antiques Center, where he sold rare books and ephemera (to this day, I believe each was a difficult decision to part from his own collections). He and I became friends, in the course of which I enjoyed the very finest introduction to English and American Literature, sitting in his sorting room while he smoked his pipe. I became a collector myself, under his tutelage; and he made it affordable by giving me ridiculously huge discounts. I learned my habit of treasuring books, and of leaving them as original as I could (this is why I still struggle to write in a book). Should you have any question how beautiful a book can be, please take me along on a trip to the Morgan Library in Manhattan, where I'll gladly give you a tour of the lower floor!

Books, of course, have long been treasures; for most of human history they were the rarest and most expensive possessions people had. Illuminated books are only the most obvious example; books have been bound in rare woods and metals, adorned with rare and colorful jewels, made to look like our common vision of a pirate's treasure chest. Sadly, the value of books and scrolls meant they were also liable to theft and desecration. During the period of the Viking invasions, monks in the Celtic islands would bury their cherished gospel collections to protect them from the sweeping vandalism and bloodshed of raids; some have only been found in the last century. The same is true of the Dead Sea Scrolls, found only in 1949; the Qumran community of the time of Jesus believed these biblical scrolls to be their most valuable gift to the future.

All this makes me think of the Treasure in the Field, a parable Jesus told in a couple of ways. This treasure is so worthwhile, the finder or seeker gives up all s/he has to get it, and feels blessed when it is found.

On the day I write this, Eugene Peterson, a very great preacher and author, has died. He is best known for the project he started with a Bible Study group in his church in Bel Air, MD; a translation project that eventually turned onto *The Message*, a Bible paraphrase into modern English (of 1971 or so) which became and remains a bestseller. Rev. Peterson's point was to democratize this greatest of gifts, the Bible. He was by no means the first to translate into the "common" language; Jerome, Tyndall, Luther and many other luminaries did so over the course of time, getting millions of Bibles into "common" hands and hearts, and bringing interpretation out of the hands of specialists only. It seemed to all of these, and it seems to me, that any treasure, but especially this treasure, is not meant to be kept, but shared; shared for its beauty and wisdom and grace and truth.

In that light, I have my own vision, that of the Kids in the Field. They not only find treasure, but share it, delighting in showing, telling, and letting go; in valuing all equally, rather than making exclusive hierarchies of value over stuff we actually only "own" a short while.

In that spirit, I began some time ago to let go of my books. Some went to my daughters (I was so pleased they finally wanted them) and to my sons-in-law; some are dedicated to my grandchildren. A Dore illustrated Douay Bible now has its home in the French Club of Princeton Seminary.

I say all this very breezily, but I was neither an instant nor a willing convert to this point of view (just ask Pam, the most dear and patient wife a man could have!). At this point in my life, though, I genuinely believe that all I may have learned, and all the sources I've learned it from, does not belong to me; rather, it is my responsibility to share every useful ounce of it (& along the way a lot of useless stuff I find interesting). Thus, along with my open door policy, I have an open library policy. You are welcome to come into my office, and browse or ask about books here, and to take them home for your own study or use. Just leave a tag or a note; for now my policy is to keep them all available to everyone. Should you fall in love with a particular book, it will be yours upon my retirement; put a sticky in it!

I do warn you, I've kept all this very brief; should you come in and ask, you just might get caught in a conversation about God, the Book, and books - but I will gracefully let you go, too!

Session Report Karen Colwill, Clerk of Session

The Session of OVPC met on Monday, October 8, 2018, in Memorial Hall.

Rev. Terry Dougherty, Moderator, opened with prayer and devotions at 7:04 P.M.

Orders of the Day:

Elaine Smith, Stephen Ministry Leader, reviewed the referral process and answered questions. We will commission 9 Stephen Ministry caregivers during worship on October 28, 2018. A reception in their honor will be held during coffee hour on November 11, 2018.

Karen Rubin-Hamilton, Chair of the Christian Education Committee presented their calendar for the last quarter of 2018 and first quarter of 2019. Session thanked the Christian Education Committee for a job well done.

Barbara Macfie, NCP Committee on Ministry and Congregations, meet with Session to complete the COMC Rounding survey. Session was prepared to answer the questions and we got to brag about OVPC and all that we do as an active congregation in and out of our community.

OVPC Congregational Meeting to Elect Officers is after worship on November 4, 2018.

OVPC Installation of Officers is during worship on November 18, 2018.

Leadership Training is schedule for Session and Deacons only on January 12, 2019.

The Monthly Committee Reports were received.

MOTION passed to approve Session Minutes of September 10, 2018.

MOTION passed to approve the September 2018 Financial Reports.

Personnel Committee MOTION passed to accept the resignation of Linda Bowers, Church Secretary, effective October 18, 2018, and place a classified in the Coastal Point for an Administrative Assistant.

Personnel Committee MOTION passed to interview candidates for Administrative Assistant at the current work week (4 days, 3 hours per day) and wage.

Cemetery Committee MOTION passed to approve new Cemetery Guidelines for Maintenance and Appearance effective January 2019.

MOTION passed authorizing Rev. Terry Dougherty to take Continuing Education for 8 days, January 22 - 29, 2019, to travel to Guatemala with the NCP Ignite Group. The costs up to \$1,500.00 will be paid by the Princeton First Call Leadership Program.

SPARK Ministry Grant: Our \$5,000.00 grant has been awarded !

MOTION made, seconded and passed to allocate **\$1,000.00** to Rwanda Joy for tuition assistance for a college student who lost his sponsor. Request from Sue Rizer.

MOTION made, seconded and passed to allocate **\$1,000.00** to Home of The Brave an organization that supports homeless veterans and families in Milford DE. They have a men's shelter and a women and children's facility. **Request from Bob Wolf.**

MOTION made, seconded and passed to allocate **\$1,000.00** to the Semper Fi Fund an organization that provides service and program for veterans, and specifically one of which trains service dogs. Funds are allocated from: \$300.00 from SPARK and \$700.00 from Memorial Reserves. Request from Earlene DiFazio.

We also received a request from Marlene Quinn to support the new Ministerium Women's Shelter in Bethany Beach. As this organization comes to fruition, we will consider allocation of support.

Session thanks all the individuals who brought forth mission opportunities for consideration and support.

MOTION made seconded and passed to investigate supporting **Rise Against Hunger** in late winter or early spring. Don Bailey will gather information and report back to Session. A few years ago we prepared 10,000 meals for Stop Hunger Now (same organization).

Reminder: The November Session Meeting is November 12, 2018 at 7:00 PM in Memorial Hall. Our meetings are open to OVPC members. Please notify the clerk if you plan to attend.

Rev. Terry Dougherty adjourned the meeting and closed with prayer at 10:20 P.M.





OVPC Cemetery Guidelines for Maintenance and Appearance Effective January 1, 2019

- Mowing shall be done in-season on a regular schedule agreed upon between the OVPC Cemetery Committee and a contractor hired through a competitive bidding process and approved by Session.
- Placement of flowers and wreaths at grave sites is permitted, but should be removed and disposed of by the family when they are no longer fresh.
- Artificial flowers are permitted, but should be removed by the family when they become faded or weather beaten.
- In the event family members are unable to remove flowers and wreaths that have expired, the Cemetery Committee shall dispose of them at its discretion.
- No planting of bushes, shrubs, trees, or flowering plants is allowed, due to interference with the mowing process. Exceptions include bulb flowers, such as daffodils or tulips, which are gone prior to the beginning of mowing season.
- After January 1, 2019 attachment of items and artifacts to headstones is prohibited regardless of means of attachment.
- Decoration of grave sites through the use of ribbons, streamers, banners, balloons, strings of lights, and special effect lighting is not allowed.
- These guidelines seek to maintain the OVPC cemetery as a hallowed, peaceful, reverent place of rest for those buried there, and for their loved ones who visit there.
- Violations to these guidelines may result in written notice from the OVPC Cemetery Committee.
